Program Request - Abbreviated Template University of Utah Bachelor of Music - Piano Pedagogy Emphasis 01/11/2016

Section I: Request

This is a request to add the Piano Pedagogy emphasis within the Bachelor of Music degree. This degree is designed for college piano students who wish to devote their lives to teaching the art of playing the piano and will focus on the techniques of being an effective pedagogue. The emphasis in Piano Pedagogy validates the candidate's expertise and commitment commencing his/her teaching career. The faculty used the following process to make this request. After assessing the need for the program, the discussion began with the three full-time and seven adjunct piano faculty members who researched national trends and assessed the faculty strengths. When the course of study was created the piano area presented the proposal to the Undergraduate Studies committee where it was discussed and approved. The proposal was then presented to the full faculty in the School of Music where it was also approved.

Section II: Need

Incoming piano majors:

Students pursuing piano as a college major are indicating a desire to major in Piano Pedagogy. Encouraged by teaching opportunities and stimulated by an impactful profession, students are pursuing studies at institutions that offer a complete program with recognized pedagogues. To be successful in recruiting the best students to the University of Utah, this degree is crucial.

Continuing students:

There is a significant population of pianists who, for various reasons, did not complete their initial piano performance degree. The pedagogy degree would encourage those in the community who began their studies in piano but did not complete the degree to return to the University of Utah to receive additional training and as a result become more effective teachers. Currently a large percentage of students, who audition for the University of Utah piano program, are lacking skills that would insure success as teachers. By mentoring our piano majors who choose teaching as a career, incoming piano recruits would be better prepared for the significant teaching opportunities now available upon graduation. This program would raise the artistic level of incoming students by mentoring those who teach in the community.

Employment

There is a need locally and nationally for well-trained piano instructors. There are new opportunities in music schools, conservatories, public and private schools and life-long learning centers and libraries that were not previously open to pianists. The Pedagogy Major would address this need.

60% by 2020

This degree will (1) assist students who have previously been in the program to return to the University of Utah to graduate and (2) provide the skills necessary for current and prospective students to graduate and join the workforce. This will accomplish the goal of Prosperity 2020.

Section III: Institutional Impact

The following statements relate to the impact on the School of Music.

- 1) No change in administrative structure will be needed for this proposal.
- 2) The effect of the proposal on faculty loads is minimal. There will be no financial burden

- to the School of Music since the increased enrollment in the Intermediate Pedagogy course will offset the expense of offering this course. The enrollment in Pedagogy will not diminish the enrollment of other School of Music programs.
- 3) The Early Childhood Behavior course will fulfill a general education requirement so that there will be no additional hours added to the Pedagogy major for this requirement.
- 4) No significant equipment or facilities are needed for this proposal and facilities will not be affected.
- 5) The Intermediate Piano Pedagogy Course has previously been approved and is in the General Catalogue, but the syllabus has been updated to more adequately reflect new trends in learning theories and student outcomes.

Section IV: Finances

There will not be any savings or additional costs from this change. Because the Intermediate Piano Pedagogy Practicum will be offered in alternate years, the enrollment in the course will offset the expense of offering the course. There will be some Piano Performance majors who will choose the Pedagogy emphasis preferring to concentrate their focus on teaching. In this way the advisor's assignment will not be adversely impacted.

Comparison to the current Piano Performance Degree

Intermediate Pedagogy Practicum I and II MUSC 4860-4861

The Pedagogy degree will add an additional year of piano pedagogy study in addition to supervised teaching in private and group settings, from beginning to advanced levels, to the current performance degree. The Intermediate Piano Pedagogy course will help prepare teachers for all levels of intermediate piano teaching and insure that student teachers will be well educated in the art of teaching children from beginning through late intermediate study.

Technology MUSC 1340

The pedagogy degree will provide instruction on the use of technology in a teaching environment. Teachers benefit their students by incorporating technology into their teaching regimen using the latest proven teaching methodologies. Students will be trained to use UPlay Piano, an internet-based piano curriculum created by the piano faculty and doctoral student for use in the Piano Outreach Program. With this technology, studies are being conducted on the correlation of music to core subjects. This training is unique to the University of Utah and is poised to partner with another successful piano sight-reading program for adoption nationally.

Middle Childhood FCS 2570

Studying middle childhood behaviors presented in the curriculum will prepare teachers to better interact with students from ages 8 through 15. Please see attached letter from Department Chair Robert N. Mayer. Coupled with the teaching experiences in the Piano Outreach Program, coordinated through the Career Development course, Piano Pedagogy majors will be well equipped to understand and meet the challenges and opportunities of teaching

Student Recital (as part of the 3993 jury)

An extended jury for the Pedagogy Major will be a half-hour lecture-recital featuring the students with whom the candidate has been working during the first three years of the program. The private applied teacher in consultation with the pedagogy instructors will choose the topic of the lecture. The senior pedagogy recital will include a pedagogy component. The student and the private applied teacher will choose the repertoire. The recital may be a solo recital or a lecture-recital where the student would discuss the musical, technical programmatic and analytical aspects of the repertoire.

The curriculum is designed to produce well-trained teachers to meet the challenges and opportunities that are currently available to pianists graduating from the University of Utah. Since this is not a music education major, students will not receive state certification. However, students will make progress towards Professional Certification with the National Music Teachers Association.

Although Weber State and Utah State have Pedagogy Degrees at the Bachelor of Music level, the University of Utah offers training in diverse cultures, group and private mentorship, and a large local population of children for immediate transition into the workforce.

*First-year Theory Rudiments Diagnostic Assessment: Every student enrolling in the Fall Semester of Music Theory I (MUSC 1110) must take First-year Theory Rudiments Diagnostic Assessment, which is offered on-line for Fall Semester. Students who do not pass the Assessment must enroll in Elements of Music on-line (MUSC 1100), which they will take as a co-requisite with Music Theory I. Students who demonstrate significant deficiencies may be required to sing in a choral ensemble for two semesters in addition to taking MUSC 1100. A workbook is available for study on the School of Music website at www.music.utah.edu.

Private Lessons: All students must submit a completed Private Lesson Application at the beginning of each semester of study. Students must meet with their major advisor to plan the semester's coursework and obtain the advisor's signature. Forms are due in the Music Office no later than the third day of classes in any given semester. Late forms will NOT be accepted.

Performance Transfer Credits: All credit in major conducted ensembles and private instruction will be accepted by the University of Utah, however, vocal/instrumental private study for all music degrees be taken in residence at the University of Utah. Auditions are required for skill-level placement for both performing ensembles and private study.

Minimum Grade: A grade of C or better is required for all music courses. Grades of C-(minus) or below in Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Arts in Music degree programs will not satisfy this requirement.
