The request to change the name of the Department is in keeping with our traditional recognition as the "Department of Radiology" and in introducing clear representation of our academic excellence.


Section III: Institutional Impact

RE: Propose name change for the Department of Radiology

Dear Dean Lee:

This letter is to formally request a name change for the Department of Radiology at the University of Utah. It is proposed that the name of "Department of Radiology" be changed to "Department of Radiology and Imaging Sciences".

The Department of Radiology held an electronic vote on April 14, 2015. Voting results: of 20 eligible tenured faculty members, 16 approval; 0 disapproval; 1 abstention; and 3 absent.

The motivation for this name change is to represent better who we are and what we do as a department. The name 'Radiology' stemmed from the use of ionizing radiation (x-ray and high-energy radiation) that was discovered more than 100 years ago. The field of radiology has evolved significantly, and we now routinely use imaging methods that use non-ionizing radiation, such as electromagnetic field and sound wave for clinical and research work. These efforts are better represented under the terms 'Imaging' and 'Imaging Sciences'.

Reflecting the field of rapidly advancing sciences, our department receives approximately \$5M of NIH funding each year. These funds are solely devoted to advance Imaging Sciences. We are currently ranked at 20th in the US. If we calculated NIH funding per faculty member, our department would be ranked within the top 10 departments in the US. Our research projects employ multi-modal imaging methods such as magnetic resonance imaging, ultrasound, computed tomography, and positron emission tomography. They are applied in clinical and pre-clinical research. The new name 'Radiology and Imaging Sciences' clearly represent better our strengths and efforts in academic medicine.

We would like to avoid the perception that we are setting academic turf through our department name change. In addition to our own departmental federal funding in imaging sciences, we collaborate even more extensively with investigators throughout the university who are interested in imaging research. We provide our expertise and imaging resources to all, while learning from investigators who have unique preclinical or clinical imaging technologies and helping them translate such technologies to potential clinical applications through our experience in imaging sciences R&D and clinical practice. Again, the new name 'Department of Radiology and Imaging Sciences' nicely encompasses our continuing efforts in the field of Radiology and Imaging Sciences and increases recognition of our department's efforts nationally and internationally.

Other major academic radiology programs are making similar department name changes. For example, radiology departments at the National Institutes of Health, Emory University, and Indiana University have now adapted the new name "Department of Radiology and Imaging Sciences." Our ophthalmology at the University of Utah took the same approach to their name including 'Visual Sciences' in their department name (Department of Ophthalmology and Visual Sciences).

In summary, we believe this name change keeps our traditional recognition of "Radiology", yet introduces a clear representation of our academic strengths through our new name. The overwhelming approval by our tenured faculty members is a clear indication that this new name well represents the current and future efforts of our department.
